am pleased to share some highlights about our Humber Bay Shores community.

Our 13th Annual Farmer's Market runs until October 11. We have some new vendors so please come check them out. This year even more we need to support our Ontario vendors. Buy Canadian.

Hold the Date! Our Annual HBSCA Golf Tournament is happening on Thursday, September 11, 2025. Register early so you don't miss out.

I would like to extend my appreciation to all the residents of Humber Bay Shores. Your participation and support play a crucial role in making these events not only possible but successful. Together, we continue to foster a strong, engaged community.

UPCOMING INITIATIVES:

- We expect that some of the work in Humber Bay Park East project to be finished by mid-Summer and we can get back to using it.
- Construction on the GO stop is set to begin in Fall 2025.
- Work is scheduled to start on A Street at the First Capital property in Fall 2025.

- The extension of Legion Road is planned to commence in Fall 2025.
- We continue to work with our Councillor Amber Morley and Toronto city staff to get Jade Park on 33 Shore Breeze Drive completed.
- Gardiner Express Rehabilitation work continues on all five bridges from Park Lawn Road to Kipling Avenue without much disruption to our community.
- Park Lawn Road on ramp to the Gardiner Express will be closed from November 2025 to May 2026.

We recognize the significant impact these projects have on traffic patterns. The city traffic mitigation measures will be put in place to help. To address this, we are actively collaborating with city staff and our elected officials to effectively manage these initiatives. We recommend allowing yourself extra time when leaving home to navigate any potential delays.

Stay Tuned! We are working on some new and exciting events and we'll be sharing some updates soon. Thank you for being a vital part of Humber Bay Shores. Here's to more wonderful memories in the coming years!

here's something about a cigar. It's not just tobacco wrapped in leaf—it's ceremony. It slows you down. It asks you to sit, to breathe, to be present. And in that quiet moment between drags, if you're lucky, it teaches you something.

It was a late spring evening when the lesson came to me. I was on my deck, halfway through a cigar, the smoke curling into the dusk. That's when it struck me: this cigar was more than a luxury—it was a metaphor.

At most cigar shops, each stick comes with a number: 30, 45, 60, 90. These numbers don't indicate price or strength, but time. That's how many minutes the

cigar is meant to last.

It's a reminder: this is temporary. Savour it. Just like life.

In the beginning of the cigar, of life—it's all new. You're excited, eager, maybe even rushing. You're distracted by the novelty. The flavour, the aroma, the moment. You puff a little too fast. You're already planning the next thing.

That's youth. The busy hum of child-hood, the rush of young adulthood. Everything feels like it will last forever.

But somewhere around the middle, things slow down. You pause. You savour. The taste deepens. And with that change comes reflection. You start asking questions. Am I spending this time wisely? Have I been good to the people I love? Have I lived in a way that would make my parents—or my kids—proud?

Then, without realizing it, you're nearing the end. The cherry creeps toward your fingertips. The smoke grows warmer, richer, more intense. You try to make each puff last a little longer. Not out of fear—but gratitude. You want to hold on.

That's where I find myself now—in my fifties, watching my children reach their own milestones. And with six children, we have many milestones. One is graduating, and one is moving to Germany. Another is getting married. I'm proud. I'm nostalgic. I'm aware that time moves only forward.

My hope? That I'm just passed the halfway point. That I still have more to sayour. That I haven't rushed it.

In our house, cigars hold more than smoke. They carry memories. Cigars remind me of my grandfather, who smoked them on the back porch, and my father, who favoured a pipe. I remember the smell of the smoke, the calm in their faces, the ritual of it all. Today, I might have one or two a month. Not because I need it, but because I want to remember. To sit still. To reflect. They didn't rush. Neither should I.

Maybe cigars aren't your thing. That's okay. But find your equivalent. A long walk. A quiet coffee. An hour with a record spinning on the turntable. Whatever makes you pause long enough to realize how fleeting—and beautiful—this life really is.

Because when it comes down to it, life is a cigar. It's meant to be savoured, not rushed.

So light it up—metaphorically or otherwise—and enjoy the moment.

'm honoured to take my seat in the Ontario Legislature as your representative for Etobicoke-Lakeshore including beautiful Humber Bay Shores. We are here to serve, my new office is located at 1136 The Queensway. Since my swearing in, I have had the privilege to visit and learn more about the many businesses, resident associations, schools, community organizations and the people who run them. Our community is rich with talented and committed residents.

At Queen's Park during the short spring session, the government introduced new legislation at a quick pace. Ten new bills passed into law. I was able to participate in debates on six of them, but many were passed without committee hearings that would have subjected them to more public scrutiny and the opportunity for amendments.

Bill 5: My office has received hundreds of emails and calls in opposition to Bill 5 that transfers unprecedented province-wide powers to the pPremier and cabinet to declare special economic zones where provincial laws and municipal by-laws can be overridden. Indigenous rights and environmental

protections are eroded. Relevant to Humber Bay, Bill 5 removes the requirement for public consultation on infrastructure projects such as at Ontario Place. For example, the Province will no longer have to notify the public about plans like the previously proposed sewage pipe for the West Channel, which was ultimately withdrawn following widespread public opposition. This is now law, but I will continue to speak out against this legislation.

Bill 13: Primary Care Access Act: Long overdue, I supported this legislation. I will keep them accountable to make progress against the 22,000 people in our riding who don't have a family doctor.

Budget Bill 24: Health and education budgets were flatlined, an effective decrease given inflation. There were no tax reductions for families or small business, nor measures on housing. Ontario craft brewers welcomed measures to support their industry, including the many we have in our riding.

I co-sponsored a Private Members Bill 28, the "Homelessness Ends with Housing Act" because affordable and supportive housing is the solution to homelessness.

Mimico GO Station: I raised the issue of accessibility at Mimico GO several

times at Queen's Park. I worked with the Mimico Residents Association to collect over 600 signatures demanding Metrolinx accelerate improvements promised for 2023 and presented it in the legislature. We'll continue fighting for these upgrades.

Unfortunately, to date, there are no firm commitments on timing for the initiation of construction on the Park Lawn GO Station. I will be advocating that the Ontario government continue to invest in our GO system as a priority over tunnels under the 401 and parking lots at Ontario Place.

FITNESS FINDS ITS

Jonathan Coelho and Alejandra Jannuzzi are two of Etobicoke's newest fitness franchisees, but what inspired them to leap into making a difference in Humber Bay? We spoke with them to find out.



ince opening in 2016, Orangetheory Fitness has had a location at 6 Park Lawn Road and, in February 2025, Ionathan and Alei finalized what would be the start of a brand new active venture for the Humber area.

Being members first and franchisees second, Jonathan and Alejandra understood the value that OTF could bring to the local community. That's where the inspiration to own a franchise started.

"We believed in it so much," said Jonathan. "We've been local residents since 2018, and want to introduce ourselves to everyone in Humber Bay Shores. If you've been here before, please come by again! We're friendly, open and always around to answer any questions you may have about your fitness and how we can help you out.

"I want everyone to feel like OTF is something they can do. A common misconception is that people think it's too intense to start here and need to 'get in shape' before attending a class.

Jonathan loves the neighbourhood and considers it his own little island away from the city. The OTF Team thoroughly enjoys taking part in local goings on, from festivals to markets. Anything that can contribute to the community is a huge part of what the OTF Parklawn location offers.

"What sets us apart is the community of people at OTF Parklawn," Jonathan continued. "They keep it going and keep pushing you to be better. It's one of the main reasons we kept coming back when we were members.

"You look forward to the people and the connections that you make here. It's priceless."

Jonathan lost 40 lbs because of the annual Transformation Challenge, which happens every January. With the help of the coaching team, Jonathan was able to hit his weight loss goal, and still continues to work out at OTF Parklawn five days a week.

When Alejandra first started to work out within the OTF community, before

Jonathan, her primary goal was to develop her cross-country skiing skills.

"Within the first 25 classes, I noticed a huge difference and fell in love." said Alejandra. "The whole workout was a great combination of things to help achieve my goals.

"It's about consistency, and the community motivates you. The coaches made time for me, too, and that's a huge deal!"

The primary goal of OTF Parklawn isn't solely to bring a new level of coach-led fitness training to the area, but also to develop as a part of the local community.

"The only way to understand OTF is to give it a try and experience it for yourself. We're more than a gym, we're a community," Jonathan finished.



COMMUNITY MEMBERS WORKING ON A NEW BIA

he Humber Bay Shores Condominium Association (HBSCA) which represents condominium residents in the Humber Bay Shores area, actively supports the establishment of a business improvement area (BIA) in our community.

The Humber Bay Shores BIA Steering Committee officially formed in February 2024 to explore establishing a business improvement area for our community.

TO INCLUDE

- Enhancing the local economy.
- Beautifying and maintaining public spaces.

- Hosting community events and programming.

ROWER NED HANLAN'S ETOBICOKE ADVANTAGE

anada's first national sporting hero, Edward "Ned" Hanlan (1855-1908), was a world champion rower. His success was partly due to a sliding seat improved by an Etobicoke inventor, Octavius Laing Hicks.

Ned, eldest son of Toronto Island hotel-keepers John and Mary Hanlan, sculled across Toronto Harbour to attend school and earned cash rowing freshly-caught fish to market, racing ahead of his competitors. Wearing his trademark blue shirt, a teenage Ned became champion of Toronto Bay. Turning pro, he gained international acclaim by wining the 1876 Philadelphia Centennial Regatta. On his return to Toronto, Ned's steamship was greeted by hundreds of boats and there was a torchlight parade down Yonge Street.

Ned was champion sculler of Canada in 1877 and US champion the following year. In 1880, he beat Australian Edward Trickett in London to become world champion.

Bruce Kidd, in *The Dictionary of Canadian Biography*, says Ned, "... competed with icy calm and, although the term had yet to be coined, was a master at "psyching out" opponents with timely taunts. When racing the arrogant Trickett he chatted with spectators ... faked a collapse, and rowed in zigzags while the Australian laboured in his wake."

At 5'-8 3/4" (1.7 m) and weighing 150 pounds (68 kg) Ned was a lightweight among champions. His secret was a smooth, powerful rowing stroke using a sliding seat, allowing his legs to assist his arms.

Etobicoke boat builder and inventor O.L. Hicks of Humber Bay helped the young oarsman by designing a superior type of slider





on four rollers that glided between tracks affixed to the boat and the seat. It reduced friction, required no lubrication and the seat could be moved with a single finger. O.L. Hicks got a patent for the seat in August 1880 and Ned used it to defend his championship, lengthening the slide for increased power.

Suffering from typhoid while visiting Australia in 1884, Ned lost his world title to Bill Beach, a 200 lb. (91 kg) blacksmith. He tried unsuccessfully to regain the title for years, but always earned money from exhibition races.

Ned married Margaret Sutherland in 1877. They had three sons and six daughters. He ran a Toronto Island hotel and was twice elected a Toronto alderman. He coached the University of Toronto and Columbia University rowing clubs. Ned died of pneumonia in January 1908 aged 52. Ten thousand people paid their respects at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church and his funeral procession was a mile long.

Emanuel Hahn's bronze statue of Ned Hanlan was unveiled at the CNE in 1926 and rededicated at the Hanlan's Point ferry dock in 2004. Actor Nicolas Cage played Ned Hanlan in a 1986 movie called *The Boy in Blue*.

PAWS ON THE PROMENADE: A GUIDE TO DOG ETIQUETTE IN HUMBER BAY SHORES

umber Bay Shores is one of Toronto's most scenic and pet-friendly neighbourhoods, where luxury condos blend with green spaces and lakefront trails. With a growing community of dog lovers, it's common to see pups enjoying morning walks, afternoon games of fetch, and peaceful sunset strolls along the waterfront.

To help ensure the neighbourhood remains welcoming and enjoyable for everyone-both dog owners and those without pets-here's a guide to considerate dog ownership in our community.

1. LEASHES ARE A MUST (EXCEPT IN DESIGNATED AREAS)

The off-leash dog park at Humber Bay Park West is a great space for dogs to run freely. Elsewhere in the neighbourhoodincluding the Humber Bay Shores Park trail, boardwalk, plaza areas, and farmers' market-dogs must be kept on a leash at all times. Even well-behaved dogs can make others uncomfortable, especially if they're nervous, recovering, or simply prefer space. In busy areas, a shorter leash helps keep everyone safe and comfortable.

2. ALWAYS CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG

Dog waste left behind is one of the most common concerns among non-dog owners. With waste bag dispensers and bins placed throughout the area, it's easy to clean up. If you forget a bag, fellow dog owners are usually happy to help. Leaving



waste behind can result in fines-and more importantly, it impacts the shared experience of our public spaces.

3. MANAGE NOISE AT HOME **AND IN PUBLIC**

While many condos in the area are petfriendly, keeping noise levels down is essential for neighbourly living. If your dog tends to bark frequently when alone, consider options like a dog walker, a pet camera, or training support. In public, try to discourage barking at other dogs, cyclists, or children to ensure everyone enjoys their time outdoors.

4. GIVE OTHERS THEIR SPACE

Not everyone is comfortable around dogs, and that's okay. Always ask before allowing your dog to approach someone, and encourage calm behaviour around others. Some people may have allergies, phobias, or cultural reasons for keeping their distance. Teaching your dog to sit or stay when others pass is a simple but respectful gesture—and a great obedience skill.

5. UNDERSTAND YOUR DOG'S NEEDS **AND LIMITS**

If your dog is reactive to certain situations, try quieter walking times or consider using tools like a yellow ribbon (a signal indicating your dog needs space) or a muzzle for added safety. These aren't signs of failure—they're responsible choices that help your dog stay calm and everyone stay safe.

6. FOLLOW YOUR CONDO'S PET POLICIES

Each building has its own rules when it comes to pets. Be sure to use designated relief areas, clean up any accidents promptly, and keep dogs leashed in all shared indoor and outdoor spaces. Respecting common areas helps maintain a positive atmosphere for everyone.

7. SUPPORT AND CONNECT WITH THE LOCAL PET COMMUNITY

Humber Bay Shores is home to a thriving pet community, including local groomers, pet shops, and social meetups for various breeds. Getting involved is a great way for your dog to socialize and for you to connect with other pet owners. Supporting local services also helps build a stronger neighbourhood.

By following these simple guidelines, we can all contribute to a cleaner, safer, and more enjoyable community—whether we walk on two legs or four. 🕮

t was the Summer of 2015, sadly a dayold chick drowned, due to the Red Necked Grebe Mom being caught in a fishing line. This was the reason members of our community came together to form Friends of Humber Bay Park (FOHBP). This became an official group September 1, 2015. Morley's office, so we can keep our residents informed about improvements etc. We encourage groups to contact us.

On our Facebook page, beautiful photos and videos are shared daily. I want to thank all that have posted. You brighten up our page. You show us the beauty in our park. You show us what we need to continue to do, PROTECT, PRESERVE and ENHANCE.

Mario Sturino who posts regularly suggested a meet-and-greet for anyone interested in photography. Not a formal photography club, but a social function where we can trade ideas.

We continue with the removal of invasive species such as: Giant Hogweed

Buckthorn, Garlic Mustard, Purple Loosestrife, Dog-strangling Vine, Wild Parsnip (will burn your skin). Also, we organize nature walks, planting and clean-ups.

At the farmers' market we have the kids paint bins. Going forward we will showcase their artwork by showing where it has been placed. These are then placed in the neighbourhood for smokers to put their cigarette butts in, instead of on the floor. When we do our clean-ups and collections, we collect cigarette butts and then send them off to Terracycle's: Unsmoke program. They recycle this most littered item in the world and make new products. We have collected over 60,000 cigarette butts so far.

Everyone who visits the park needs to take responsibility by taking their trash with them. One must leave a place better than one found it; this is my mantra. Maintaining the biodiversity of this area will preserve it as a birding and wildlife hotspot.
